GENERAL INFORMATION

Accreditation

VHBC is recognized by the State of Georgia as a Domestic Non-Profit Corporation as set forth by Title 14 of the official Code of Georgia Annotated as of June 17, 1997.

VHBC is a member of the Georgia Council of Private Colleges and is fully accredited by Transworld Accrediting Association (TAA).

VHBC has a worldwide affiliation as a member of the International Communion of Charismatic Churches (ICCC).

Units of Credit

Vineyard Harvester Bible College uses the module as a unit of credit. A module is a unit of credit that is equivalent to one semester hour of credit. A module may be obtained in the following ways:

A module may be obtained by enrolling in a class which requires 12 hours of lectures and other activities, including required assigned readings, study guides, attendance, projects, and examinations.

A module may be received by attending seminars, workshops, and conferences of at least 12 hours approved by the

Dean of Academic Affairs. In addition, readings and a written report may be required.

A module may be received by transferring credits from another approved school or program. One module is equivalent to one semester hour of credit. Transfer credits must be approved by the Dean of Academic Affairs.

Classes on Main Campus of VHBC

Regular classes on the main campus of VHBC will be conducted each term, primarily on Tuesdays and Thursday, from 6:00 P.M. through 9:00 P.M. There will be two regular terms during the school year: Fall and Spring. Each term will be twelve weeks in duration, with eighteen (18) hours of class time per course. Two one-credit courses (12 hours each) are offered during a 4-week Mini-Mester in May. These classes will meet on Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 6:00-7:30 and 7:30-9:00 PM. In addition, one module of credit may be earned through eight (8) weeks of teaching in Wednesday night classes for one and one-half hours per week. There will be three (3) such eight-week Wednesday night terms during the year.

Seminar Credits at VHBC

Occasionally, there will be weekend seminars presented during the year, which will be conducted on Friday night from 6:00 P.M. until 9:00 P.M. and on Saturday from 8:00 A.M. until 5:30 P.M. with a one-hour break at lunch, a fifteen-minute break at mid-morning, and a fifteen-minute break at mid-afternoon. There may be an outside project required which must be sent back to the main campus within 30 days of the seminar.

One or two module(s) of credit(s) may be earned through attendance at and participation in the Summer Conference in

Cedartown, Georgia each first Wednesday after the Fourth of July through the following Sunday evening. An outside assignment may be required, which should be completed and mailed back to VHBC within 30 days. Complete information on these special sessions will be available closer to the proposed dates.

Correspondence School

A student may enroll in any degree program offered by VHBC and complete classes through video presentations. A correspondence school student must be a regularly enrolled student by completing all entrance and registration requirements. There is a one-time video fee of \$100.00, in addition to the tuition fee for each course (see Tuition and Fees Schedule). All current fees must be paid before any videos are released. All videos remain the property of VHBC and must be returned before any others are issued.

For first-time enrollees, only one course will be sent. When this course is completed, you may take two courses at a time. If a student is full-time, then he/she must complete 30 courses per calendar year, which means that the pace should be that of a regular student on the main campus. This would mean taking three courses for each eight-week term. In such case, a student will be issued up to three courses at a time. Each course would normally be for 1 ½ hours per week for 8 weeks (for a one-credit course). A student is allowed to work at his/her own pace; however, there is a time limit of 180 days after the course is sent. After the time limit expires, all videos must be returned to Vineyard Harvester Bible College, and to continue study, the student must re-enroll (unless arrangements have been made for unusual circumstances). Video tapes must be returned to Vineyard Harvest Bible College before additional courses are made available. All study guides and exams must be returned with video

tapes. No new courses will be issued unless the student is current on all fees and charges.

A current list of video courses is available upon request.

Affiliate Bible Colleges

Affiliate Bible Colleges will be established in conjunction with approved local churches throughout the U.S.A. A large percentage of classes offered through satellite schools will be by video from VHBC. In many instances, these local schools may offer courses by instructors of the local school. All courses and classes must be approved by the Dean of Academic Affairs of Vineyard Harvester Bible College. All candidates for any degree must have had a minimum of 50% of their course work directly from VHBC. These courses may be obtained in a variety of ways, which are described under the heading "Live-teaching Offerings."

Students of affiliate schools will be enrolled in VHBC with all records being kept at the main office. Upon completion of degree requirements, diplomas will be issued by VHBC. Any local church may become an affiliated school by making application to and being approved by VHBC.

Transfer Policy

Credits may be transferred into an Associate Degree Program or a Bachelor Degree Program. No transfer credits will be accepted for a One-Year Certificate. When transferring into an eligible program, we will accept equivalent credits from other qualified colleges, provided the grade of "C" or above has been received. All transfer credits must be compatible with Vineyard Harvester Bible College's programs of study and must be approved by the Dean of Academic Affairs.

Courses that do not have a VHBC equivalent, but are academic in nature, are counted as elective credit unless transferred to meet a specific requirement. If a course is to meet a specific requirement, there must be written approval from the Dean of Academic Affairs. A student must present all transcripts for analysis, and a fee of \$7.50 is assessed for each equivalent of a modular credit transferred into VHBC. A maximum of 30 credits may be transferred toward an associate degree, and a maximum of 60 credits may be transferred toward a bachelor degree. All courses required by VHBC must be met for each degree program.

Credits by Testing

Students making a sufficient score on an English proficiency examination may receive up to three (3) credits toward core curriculum requirements. Also, up to three (3) credits may be earned by obtaining a sufficient score on an English Composition examination. A fee at the regular tuition rate must be paid for all credits received by examination.

Life-experience Credits

A student over thirty years of age may make application for life-experience credits. Guidelines for submission of life experiences will be made available upon being accepted as a student. Up to 30 credits may be earned, depending upon prior experiences, training, honors, accomplishments, and verification of leadership qualities. A fee of \$7.50 is assessed for each credit granted for life experiences.

Drop/Add Refund Policy

A student may drop classes for an 80% refund, or may

change classes, only before the beginning of the second session of the course. After the beginning of the second session there will be no refund, and no classes can be changed. (This policy does not apply to correspondence students).

Transcripts

All transcripts must be requested in writing by the student. All written requests should include the student's name as registered, the student's social security number, the date the student last attended, the name and address of the person to receive transcripts, and how many copies are to be sent. There is a \$4.00 fee for each transcript.

CERTIFICATES AND DEGREES

Vineyard Harvester Bible College offers numerous programs to fit the individual student's need. One-year certificates may be earned in Bible and Biblical Studies, Ministry, and Christian Counseling. One-year certificates may be received upon successful completion of 30 modules in the field of study.

Two-year and four-year degrees in Bible and Biblical Studies, Ministry, Christian Counseling, Christian Education, and Family and Human Development may be earned. Additionally, graduate degrees may be earned in Bible and Biblical Studies, Ministry, and Christian Counseling.

Associate Degree Programs

Associate degree programs consist of 60 modules of credit, which includes the Core Curriculum (30 units) in addition to 20 units in the study area of specialty. A 2.0 grade point average (GPA) must be averaged for the associate program. In the major area of study, an average of 2.5 must be maintained.

Bachelor Degree Requirements

To receive a Bachelor of Theology Degree from Vineyard Harvester Bible College, 120 modules must be completed with a grade average of at least a "C," (GPA of 2.0). The Core Curriculum must be completed, and a major and minor area of study must be declared. A grade average of at least a "B" should be maintained in the major area of study. No credit can be granted for a course in the major with a grade less than "C."

Bachelor degrees are offered in the fields of Bible and Biblical Studies, Ministry, Christian Counseling, and Family and Human Development. A minor may be obtained in Christian Education.

The course of study for the bachelor degree must include the following:

Major: 30 modules

Minor: 18 modules.

Core: 30 modules.

Electives: 42 modules.

Total: 120 modules.

Bachelor of Theology in Bible and Biblical Studies

To receive a Bachelor of Theology degree in Bible and Biblical Studies, one must successfully complete 120 modules, including the Core Program (30 modules), 30 modules of Bible and/or Biblical Studies, and 18 modules in the minor area of study.

The minor area may be in any field.

Bachelor of Theology in Ministry

To receive a Bachelor of Theology degree in Ministry, one

must successfully complete 120 modules, including the Core Program (30 modules), 30 modules of Ministry courses, and 18 modules in the minor area of study. **The minor area may be in any field.**

Bachelor of Theology in Christian Counseling

To receive a Bachelor of Theology degree in Christian Counseling, one must successfully complete 120 modules, including the Core Program (30 modules), 36 modules of Christian Counseling (which can also include Marriage and Family courses in the area of Social Issues), and 18 modules in the minor area of study.

Following are the required courses in Christian Counseling: COU201, COU211, COU212, COU213, COU301, COU321, COU322, COU323, COU342, COU431, COU451, COU461, COU471, COU473.

Required courses: 14 modules

Elective counseling/family/marriage courses: 22 modules

The minor area of study: Any area.

Graduate Programs

Master of Theology

In order to become a candidate for the Master of Theology degree, an individual must have a bachelor degree from an approved school. The Master of Theology program must include 30 modules of course work in addition to a thesis (6 modules). The program of study must be approved by the Dean of Academic Affairs.

A Master's degree may be earned in the following fields of study:

Bible and Biblical Studies

Ministry

Christian Counseling

Doctor of Theology

The Doctor of Theology degree is available in Bible and Biblical Studies. The doctoral program should include 90 graduate credits which includes those credits earned in a Masters program. Generally speaking, that would be approximately 60 credits beyond the Masters which includes a 12-credit dissertation.

The doctoral program must include a major area of study as well as a collateral area of study. Complete details of the doctoral program must be worked out with the chairperson of the doctoral committee, including the fulfillment of residency requirements.

A continuation of BIB111 with a survey of the book of Romans, the two books of Corinthians, the Epistles to the Galatians, Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, Thessalonians, and to Timothy.		
BIB113	New Testament Survey III	1
A continuation of BIB112 with a survey of the Epistles to Titus, Philemon, the Hebrews, James, Peter, John, and Jude. The Book of Revelation is the final book studied.		
BIB251	The Life of Christ	1
This course takes a specific look at the life and teachings of Jesus, including His humanity, deity, and incarnation.		
BIB252	The Miracles of Jesus in the Gospel of John	1
In addition to another course that focuses on the Gospel of John in general, a study will be made of the special miracles of Jesus in the Gospel		
BIB258	The Book of Acts	1
A study of the history of the church in its inception with an emphasis on the miraculous ministries of the apostles through the power of the Holy Spirit.		
BIB261	The Book of Romans	1
A study of such themes as faith, justification, the law, grace, and the		

righteousness of God. A look at the old man and the new man; sonship; covenant; the true Jews.		
BIB271	An Exposition of Matthew 24	1
A study of Matthew 24 as having already been fulfilled instead of a futuristic fulfillment.		
BIB281	The Spiritual Man	1
Man was created a triune being in the likeness of God. He is a spirit, he has a soul, and he lives in a body. This course will look specifically at man as a spiritual being.		
BIB285	The Gospel of Matthew	1
The gospels each tell the story of Jesus' miracles and teachings from a different point of view. Matthew is primarily writing to the Jews.		
BIB286	The Gospel of Mark	1
The gospels each tell the story of Jesus' miracles and teachings from a different point of view. The first half of the course continues the Gospel of Matthew. The second half of the course focuses on Mark. Mark's aim is to give a picture of the life of Jesus in the simplest and most dramatic way, showing his humanity.

The gospel of Luke has been called the loveliest book in the world. Luke portrays Jesus as the sacrifice for all the world, as barriers are broken down between the Jews and Gentiles.		
BIB288	The Gospel of John	1
The gospel of John is different from the other three gospels. John gives record of different miracles as well as giving longer discourses on the teachings of Jesus. Many consider the gospel of John as being more from a heavenly point of view.		
BIB295	The Person and Work of the Holy Spirit	1
A look is taken at the person and work of the third person of the Holy Trinity. This full impact of the course is experientially, as the Holy Spirit can speak better for Himself than we.		
BIB297	The Gifts of the Holy Spirit	1
This course presents an in-depth study of the Gifts of the Holy Spirit with an emphasis on the practical activation of those gifts in the Local Church.		
BIB341	Advanced Study of New Testament I	1.5
A look at the New Testament from a Kingdom perspective. Emphasis on the spirit of revelation through the divine work of the Holy Spirit.		
BIB342	Advanced Study of New Testament II	1.5
A look at the New Testament from a Kingdom perspective. Emphasis on the spirit of revelation through the divine work of the Holy Spirit. (Continuation of		

BIB341).		
BIB351	First and Second Corinthians	2
Practical problems, doctrines, and difficulties of a local church are discussed in these two epistles of Paul. There is a detailed discussion of divisions in the church, carnal Christians, leadership problem, church discipline, Christian marriage, the Lord's Supper, the resurrection of Christ, and many other such topics.		
BIB352	Hebrews I	1
An in-depth study of the book of Hebrews with an emphasis on "better things." A study of God's New Covenant and the order of Melchizedek.		
BIB353	Hebrews II	1
A continuation of the Book of Hebrews with an emphasis on a better priesthood and a better temple.		
BIB361	Ephesians	1
A study of the epistle to the Ephesians with a special emphasis on our position in Christ Jesus in heavenly places, the household of God, the ascension gifts, husband/wife relationships, and the whole armor of God.		
BIB362	Galatians	1
A study of the epistle to the Galatians with a comparison between law and grace. A study is dedicated to such topics as the seed of Abraham, spiritual maturity, liberty, and the fruit of the Spirit.		
BIB371	Philippians & Colossians	1
A study of the writings of Paul including the letters to the Philippians and Colossians.		
BIB372	The General Epistles	1
This course covers the remaining books of the New Testament not taught in other courses: James; First, Second, and Third John; and Jude.		
BIB373	Timothy, Titus, and Philemon	1
This course is a continuation of the Pauline Epistles, looking specifically at the personal letters to Timothy, Titus, and Philemon.		
BIB373	First and Second Thessalonians	1
The two epistles to the church at Thessalonica are rich in revelation of the question of the coming of Christ. This is an important study from a kingdom point of view.		
BIB381	First and Second Peter	1
Of all the General Epistles, First Peter is best known and most read. It is written out of the love of a pastor's heart to help people who are going through some of the worst days of persecution. Second Peter was written to combat the beliefs and activities of certain men who were a threat to the Church		
BIB391	The Finished Work of Christ	1.5

A study of redemption, reconciliation, and justification in light of the Finished Work of the Cross of Christ.		
BIB431	The Apocalypse	1
An in-depth study of the Revelation of Jesus Christ as was given to John with its symbolism and meaning for today. A study of overcoming, the manchild company, the true church, the city of God, and the Battle of Armageddon.		
BIB485	The Book of Revelation	2
This two and one-half credit course is a most unique study chapter by chapter and verse by verse of the Book of Revelation with a total emphasis on "The Revelation of Jesus Christ."		
Biblical Studies		
BIB133	Creation and Fall	1
A study of the story of creation with a look at different theories. The plan of redemption is studied in light of man's fall. A look at the purposes of God.		
BIB141	The Grace & Sovereignty of God	1
A study of the nature of God as it relates to His grace and sovereignty.		
BIB151	New Creation Realities I	1
A study of the new birth, the Kingdom of God, the Promise, who we are in Christ, who Christ is in us, a finished work and a perfected Bride--predestined, called, justified, glorified, sanctified, and made righteous.		
BIB152	New Creation Realities II	1
A continuation of BIB151 studying such topics as the work of God, the Living Word, the promises to Abraham, the seed of Abraham, our inheritance, and much, much more.		
BIB153	New Creation Realities III	3
Focus will be on the preeminence, the Lordship, and the centrality of the Lord Jesus Christ. There is also a study of the government, rule and authority of God in the earth. Practically speaking it is His rule or His government in our life.		
BIB161	Principles of Faith I	1.5
God is a faith God. Without faith, it is impossible to please Him. This is a study of important scriptures and principles of faith.		
BIB242	Basics of Studying the Bible	1
This is a course that will teach the basics of techniques and strategies for successfully studying the Word of God.		
BIB282	The Spirit Man	1
A study of man as a triune being--spirit, soul, and body with an emphasis on the spiritual aspect of man.		

BIB301	The Progression of the Kingdom	1
The Kingdom of God is likened unto a seed. It has a small beginning but grows until it envelops the whole earth. This is the study of the progression of the kingdom of God.		
BIB410	Dominion Theology	1
A study of God’s original mandate to subdue the earth and to have dominion over it. How man lost his dominion and how it is to be regained.		
BIB411	Systematic Theology from a Kingdom Perspective I	1
This first course of systematic theology will cover the doctrine of the Scriptures; the doctrine of salvation; and the doctrine of the Church.		
BIB412	Systematic Theology from a Kingdom Perspective II	1
The second course of systematic theology will study the doctrine of God; the doctrine of Jesus Christ; and the doctrine of the Holy Spirit.		
BIB413	Systematic Theology from a Kingdom Perspective III	1
The third course of systematic theology studies the doctrine of Man; the doctrine of Angels (including demons and Satan); and Eschatology--the doctrine of “last things.”		
BIB414	Eschatological Studies	1
A deeper study of “last things” including physical death, the resurrection from the dead, the second coming of Christ, the “rapture” of the church, various millennial viewpoints, and judgments.		
BIB412	The Feasts of Israel	1
A study of the Feasts of Israel, interpreting them in light of present-day truth. The intricate details of the Mosaic economy become meaningless unless all is seen through the Cross in relation to Christ and the church.		
BIB415	The Tabernacle of Moses - I	1
An introduction to the history, construction, furnishings, Levitical offerings, and the Priesthood. A detailed study of each of the courts and the Holy of Holies with their application to worship then and now.		
BIB416	The Tabernacle of Moses - II	1
A continuation of BIB415 with an in-depth look at the Priesthood.		
BIB417	The Tabernacle of David	1.5
God promised that He would restore the Tabernacle of David that had been torn down. At the time that the Tabernacle of Moses was set up in Mt. Gibeon with its animal sacrifices, there was another Tabernacle in Mt. Zion where the Ark of Covenant resided.		
BIB421	Types and Shadows	1.5
The Christian culture has a language all of its own. It is the language of divine origin--the language of the sign and symbol. This course studies the significance of types and shadows in the Word of God as they relate to present-		

day truth. Principles are given to interpret these signs and symbols.		
BIB435	The Church, the World, and the Kingdom	1.5
This course will present the Kingdom of God in the earth and how it relates to the Church and the World.		
BIB441	Kingdom Concepts I	1
An introduction to the study of the Kingdom of God. What it is; where it is; and when it is.		
BIB442	Kingdom Concepts II	1
A continuation of the study of the Kingdom of God and how the kingdom of the heavenlies is being brought to earth.		
BIB443	Kingdom Concepts III	1
An in-depth study of the purposes of God in light of His original mandate in the Book of Genesis--to have dominion over the earth and all that is within. A worldly spirituality, which is the call to take care of the earth, is a topic of study.		
BIB451	Advanced Principles of the Kingdom I	1
A more in-depth study of Kingdom principles as they apply to present-day truth.		
BIB452	Advanced Principles of the Kingdom II	1
A continuation of the study of Kingdom principles in light of present-day truth.		
BIB453	Advanced Principles of the Kingdom III	1
A continuation of the study of Kingdom principles in light of present-day truth		
BIB461-466	Bible Seminar	1-6
A study of selected contemporary Biblical topics of interest.		
BIB491	The Pauline Revelation	2
What is meant by the Pauline Revelation? What was the gospel that Paul preached? How was it different from the Gospel that had previously been taught? This is a study of the revelation of the Glorified Christ, the meaning of the Work of Redemption, and the Church as the Body of Christ.		

Ministry

MIN201	Foundations and Principles of Ministry I	1.5
This course will focus on the development of the person as a minister of the gospel. An emphasis will be placed on the eminence of the Word of God and some of the major doctrines of the first principles of the Bible.		
MIN202	Foundations and Principles of Ministry II	1.5
This course will be a continuation of the first principles of the doctrines of Christ including atonement, justification, sanctification, faith, doctrine of baptisms, healing and the ministry of laying on of hand, and the resurrection. There will be a basic study of the person and work of the Holy Spirit.		

MIN203	Foundations and Principles of Ministry III	1.5
The third course of this series will deal with the “spirit” world, spiritual warfare, and ministry of angels. In general, the student will study the principles of living a victorious, overcoming life.		
MIN204	Foundations and Principles of Ministry IV	1.5
The final course in this series will deal the concept of us “being created for purpose and destiny.” We were created according to God’s predestined plan—for His pleasure and for us to serve Him. We have been created to be a world changer, as salt and light. We also were created as stewards of the earth.		
MIN211	An Introduction to Hermeneutics	1
Hermeneutics is defined as, “The science of interpretation, or of finding the meaning of an author’s words and phrases, and of explaining it to others; exegesis, particularly applied to the interpretation of Scriptures.”		
MIN221	Church History I	1
A history of the church from the early church fathers through the reformers.		
MIN222	Church History II	1
A continuation of MIN221 with a study of Church History from the reformers up to the twentieth century.		
MIN223	Church History III	1
A continuation of MIN222 with a special emphasis on the movements of the twentieth century, including the Welsh Revival, the Azusa Street outpouring, the Pentecostal movements, and the “Latter Rain” revival.		
MIN231	Ministry of Healing	1
Basic principles of the ministry of healing from the Old and New Testaments. Topics include the will of God to heal, hindrances to healing, ways to receive healing, and the table of the Lord.		
MIN241	Motivational Gifts	1
A study of the gifts of Romans 12 including prophecy, service, teaching, exhortation, giving, mercy, and ruling.		
MIN251	Principles of Leadership	1
This course will take a look at different leadership styles as well as principles for inspiring, motivating, and influencing others. These principles can be used in any organization to foster integrity and self-discipline and bring about a positive change.		
MIN271	Studies of Modern Men and Women of Faith	1
A study of the lives of John Alexander Dowie, Maria Woodworth-Etter, Evan Roberts, Charles F. Parham, William J. Seymour, John G. Lake, Smith Wigglesworth, Aimee Semple McPherson, Kathryn Kuhlman, William Branham, Jack Coe, A. A. Allen, and Oral Roberts.		
MIN281	Church Structure and Ministries	1

This course is devoted to understanding the local church, its organization, and its ministries.

MIN291	Ministry of Prayer & Intercession	1
A study of the importance of prayer and the various forms of prayer, including prayers of petition and intercession. A study of great men and women of prayer.		
MIN293	Ministry of Praise and Worship	1
A study of the importance of praise and worship and the distinction between the two. Special emphasis on worship including what it is, how to become a worshiper, moving in the prophetic, and entering the presence of God through worship.		
MIN295	Covenant	2
This is a timely course of study presenting the 18 principles of “A Covenant Heart.”		
MIN206	The Minister as a Person	1
This course lessons on the practicality of ministry, including good interpersonal relationships, personal appearance, and general manners.		
MIN311	Ministry of Evangelism	1
Important principles of evangelism including one-on-one ministry as well as mass evangelism.		
MIN321	The Ministry of the Holy Spirit	2
A study of the person and work of the Holy Spirit as the Third Person of the godhead, as well as an in-depth study of the gifts and ministries of the Holy Spirit.		
MIN331	Principles of Divine Health	1
A study of the principles of divine health based on scripture, diet, exercise, lifestyle, and proper handling of emotions.		
MIN343	Dealing with Everyday Problems of Life	1.5
Learning how to cope with difficult situations and circumstances in life and being able to teach others. Topics include unbelief, a passive mind, depression, disappointment, sickness, anger, a broken home, mental illness, suicidal tendencies, guilt complex, death, feelings of unforgiveness, rejection, feeling unloved, bitterness, sin, lack of self-confidence, rebellion, prejudice, anxiety, sorrow, human grief, tension, lust, and other general human problems. (Same as COU343).		
MIN351	Ministering to the Whole Person	1.5
God’s will for us is wholeness. One cannot separate the needs of the physical man nor the natural man. This will be a more in-depth look at the analysis, definitions, and functions of the spirit, soul, and body.		
MIN361	Apostolic Strategies Affecting Nations	1
Practical strategies designed to help mobilize the Body of Christ in effectively		

ministering to the sphere of influence including that of the nation.		
MIN401	History of Revival	1
A study of the important revivals and moves of God throughout the history of mankind.		
MIN421	Ministry of the Prophetic	1
A study of prophets and prophecies including historical as well as modern-day. Topics included are general principles and channels of prophecies, how to properly respond to personal prophecies, and hindrances to fulfilled prophecies.		
MIN431	Outreach Ministries	1
A study of a variety of ministries designed to reach specific populations outside the church, including ministry to the poor, ministry to unwed mothers, ministry to AIDS patients, jail and prison ministry, as well as ministry to a variety of other special groups.		
MIN432	Training for Service	1
A study of the important ministry of helps, including organizational skills, ushering, greeting, and maintenance.		
MIN451-456	Seminar	1-6
Selected topics of contemporary interest on ministry.		
MIN461	The Ministry of the Word	1
The Ministry of the Word should take preeminence over every other ministry in the church. This is a look at the different kinds of ministry and the work of the Holy Spirit's interpretation and revelation.		
MIN471	Ministerial Etiquette and Proper Protocol	1
A course which defines ministry. How a minister should conduct himself in the House of the Lord.		
MIN482	Signs, Symbols, and Liturgy	1
This is a course that teaches the importance of knowing the meaning of signs and symbols to properly understand the revelation of the Word of God. A look is taken at the significance of liturgy as a form of visual worship.		
MIN498	Proper Paradigms for Ministerial Excellence	1
In order for the twenty-first century church to be relevant and effective in reaching the world, we must take a different approach as to how we see the role of the Church as it relates to the world.		

Christian Counseling

COU201	An Introduction to Christian Counseling	1.5
What is Christian Counseling? How does Christian Counseling relate to secular counseling? These and other questions will be answered in this introductory course.		

COU211	Basic Helping Skills and Techniques	1
This is an introductory course in understanding the helping profession, especially as it relates to Christian counseling. Some topics will include establishing a helping relationship through empathy and good listening skills. In general, it will deal with the study of the counseling process, the counselor-counsee relationship, counselor characteristics, and counseling techniques.		
COU212	The Helping Interview	1
This course will be primarily devoted to the implementation of the skills learned in COU201 as they apply to the actual helping interview.		
COU213	Counseling Strategies	1
A course which presents counseling strategies to deal with problems in behavioral, cognitive, and affective domains. Establishing counseling goals will be an important topic of discussion.		
COU221	The Lay Person as Counselor	1.5
A person does not have to be a professional counselor to help others; lay persons can be very effective in giving a listening ear to many who are experiencing everyday emotional experiences.		
COU301	Christian Counseling Theories	1.5
A look at contrasting approaches to Christian counseling, including those proposed by Jay Adams and Larry Crabb. A look will also be taken of a variety of secular theories for the purpose of contrast. An analysis of various models of integration of psychology and theology. The student will be directed in defining his or her theory and approach to counseling.		
COU321	Counseling Issues I: Intro	1
An overview of a variety of counseling issues including personal, developmental, interpersonal, violence and abuse, identity, family, premarital, marital, and addictions. Each of these issues are dealt with in more detail in other specific counseling courses.		
COU322	Counseling Issues II	1
Emotional issues, such as anxiety, fear, anger, depression, guilt, loneliness, and stress will be discussed. Each emotion will be defined, a scriptural basis given, and a counseling approach proposed.		
COU323	Counseling Issues III	1
Identity issues include those of self-esteem, self-worth, and self-importance. A look will be taken at the scriptural teaching of loving oneself and others. An approach presented for counseling those with identity problems. Also, the course will deal with interpersonal relationships.		
COU342	Theories of Personality	1
The basis for a course in Christian Theories of Personality is the fact that man is a triune being--spirit, soul, and body. A detailed and in-depth study of this		

premise will be conducted. A comparison will be made with some of the most popular secular theories of personality. A presentation of a biblical model of personality.

COU343	Dealing with Everyday Problems of Life	1.5
Learning how to cope with difficult situations and circumstances in life and being able to teach others. Topics include unbelief, a passive mind, depression, disappointment, sickness, anger, a broken home, mental illness, suicidal tendencies, guilt complex, death, feelings of unforgiveness, rejection, feeling unloved, bitterness, sin, lack of self-confidence, rebellion, prejudice, anxiety, sorrow, human grief, tension, lust, and other general human problems.		
COU351	Stress Management	2
Defining stress and identifying biological, sociological, psychological, and stressors. Stress management techniques studied. Study of stress management techniques, including life situation interventions such as assertiveness training, conflict resolution, communication, time management skills, humor, relaxation, and anxiety management.		
COU401	Marital Counseling	2
An introduction to marital counseling with an overview of issues, theories, and techniques. Factors which determine the structure of the counseling session are discussed. Other specific topics include how unsatisfactory marital behavior patterns develop, pre-counseling contact and assessment, and the initial interview.		
COU402	Premarital Counseling	1
A study of premarital counseling presenting a program which may be implemented for future counseling. Topics of discussion include family backgrounds, attitudes toward marriage, marital expectations, goals in marriage, communication, conflict resolution, sex, finances, and in-laws. Planning the ceremony and honeymoon will also be discussed.		
COU421	Marriage Enrichment: A Preventive Approach	1
A preventive approach to marital counseling will be the subject of this course. Important issues of marriage enrichment will be discussed which are designed to "make good marriages better." Topics include marital goals, marital roles, marital expectations, communication skills, conflict resolution, spiritual issues, sex, and intimacy.		
COU431	Legal and Ethical Issues of Counseling	1
A study of the legal and ethical issues of Christian counseling, including issues of confidentiality, privileged communication, informed consent, liability, compelling state interest, malpractice, elements of negligence, invasion of privacy, and involuntary commitment		
COU441	Counseling Teens	2

The teenage years is a unique period of a person's life. This is a study of adolescence with special attention given to selected counseling issues.

COU441	Crisis Intervention	1
Crisis intervention counseling techniques. Responding properly in crises situations, including those which are situational, developmental, or existential. Discussion of goals of crisis intervention especially during the first 72 hours.		
COU442	Crisis Intervention II	1
A continuation of COU471. Crisis intervention issues of abuse, violence, drug and alcohol, disasters, and professional burnout.		
COU451	Inventories and Measurements	1
A study of various instruments of measurement used in counseling, including self-esteem, behavior, social interaction, love, sex, and anxiety inventories.		
COU461	Group Counseling	2
A study of the dynamics of group counseling. Topics include the process, forming a group, the stages of a group, and legal and ethical issues of group counseling.		
COU463	Abuse & Violence Counseling	1
An overview of different types of abuse and violence, including wife and husband battering, child abuse, child sexual abuse, rape, and incest. There will also be a study dedicated to counseling survivors of drug and alcohol abusers.		
COU464	Loss and Grief Counseling	1
Counseling those who have suffered loss, including the loss of a family member through death, loss of employment, loss of self-esteem, loss through a failed pregnancy, loss through the divorce of a spouse, and loss through children growing up and leaving home.		
COU473	Counseling the Culturally Different	2
This course speaks to the diversification of cultures in the United States. Barriers to effective multi-cultural counseling are addressed. Issues related to working with ethnic minority families are presented. A conceptual model is analyzed with its practical implications.		
COU475	Addiction Counseling	2
A course designed to help understand the addictive process and compulsive behavior. Gives a description of the process of addiction, the causes, stages of development, and consequences. Examines how addictions begin and how they progress, as well as how our society often encourages addictive behavior.		
COU476	Family Counseling	2
An introduction to Family Counseling with an emphasis on seeing an individual problem as the result of a breakdown in the family system. A look at various family counseling theories.		
COU477	Therapy with Children	2

This course deals with an innovative, effective, brief therapy approach to time-sensitive assessment and intervention with children and families. A step-by-step approach takes the student through the entire treatment process, presenting practical guidelines to create a climate for change.

COU478	Addiction Counseling Strategies	2
Practical applications to principles from COU475.		
COU479	Drug Abuse Seminar	1
A seminar dealing with the major issues of drug abuse.		
COU481-486	Counseling Seminar I	1-6
Selected topics of interest in Christian counseling.		
COU491-493	Christian Counseling Practicum	1-3
Students will meet with class for 6 hours and meet with counseling supervisor for an additional 3 hours. Students will be required to present taped sessions with clients for critique with supervisor. Students must have senior status to enroll in practicum.		
COU581	Counseling Internship I	3
Internship credits may be earned only by graduate students who have completed all of their course work. Internships will be under the supervision of a practicing Christian counselor.		
COU582	Counseling Internship II	3
Internship credits may be earned only by graduate students who have completed all of their course work. Internships will be under the supervision of a practicing Christian counselor.		

Psychology, Sociology, Family, and Human Development

PSY101	Introduction to Psychology	1
This course covers a brief history of psychology, what it is and where it came from. The physiological basis of behavior, states of consciousness, sensation and perception, and learning and behavior are topics of study.		
PSY102	Introduction to Psychology II	1
This is a continuation of PSY101. Topics covered in this course are memory, thinking and intelligence, psychological assessment, motivation and emotion, personality, and the life cycle. Additional topics include cognitive and linguistic development, social and moral development, stress and conflict, abnormal behavior, therapy, social perception and cognition, attitudes, and social influence and interaction.		
SOC104	An Introduction to Sociology I	1

A study of society, with a special look at social institutions, social relationships, and the socialization process. The socialization process includes the family, church, school, peers, and the media and covers the lifespan of the individual from childhood to old age.

SOC105	An Introduction to Sociology II	1
A continuation of SOC101. This course will deal with social inequalities, including social classes, poverty, gender, and race. An historical overview will be made of the economy of the United States as it moved from an agricultural society to the age of technology.		
SOC106	An Introduction to Sociology III	1
A continuation of SOC101 and SOC102. Topics for discussion will include the study of the social institutions of government, family, church, and school upon society. Other topics include the sociological issues of health, population, urbanization, environment, and collective behavior of society.		
SOC201	Gender Issues	1
An overview of issues which relate specifically to women. These issues include inequalities in the workplace, the woman's role in the home, women in ministry, and the feminist movement.		
SOC211	Child Training	1
A course in training children for the Lord. A study of early childhood, including topics on understanding children's behavior and misbehavior. Learning how to help children to accept responsibilities by teaching them natural and logical consequences.		
SOC221	Seminar on Child Abuse	1
This course is designed to bring awareness and training to those who work with children, whether that be in the school, church, or community. The recognition of the signs of abuse are discussed as well as legal and ethical issues related to child abuse. Child abuse can be physical, emotional, psychological, or sexual.		
SOC231	Introduction to Human Development	1
An introduction to human development including history of developmental studies and current issues in developmental studies. Theories of development with a special study of Erikson's Psychosocial Theory. An overview of the major stages of human development over the lifespan.		
SOC240	Prenatal, Birth, and Infancy	1
This course is devoted to the study of human development from conception to birth and finally through the first two years of life.		
SOC241	Early Childhood Development	1
A study of the physical, psycho-social, and cognitive development of children from birth through the preschool years. An in-depth look at the development of the nervous system, motor skills, perception, and learning of children in first		

two years of life. Also, includes the role of play in early childhood.

SOC242 Middle Childhood Development 1
 A study of the physical, motor, intellectual, language, and psychosocial development of children through age three through the preteen years.

SOC251 Multi-cultural Studies 1
 A study of the diversity of cultures in the United States. Designed to help the student develop an appreciation of those who are racially, socially, or culturally different.

SOC301 Adolescence 2
 A study of the biological, psychological, sociological, and spiritual issues of youth from early adolescence through the teen years. This course covers a range of practical issues including a study of day-to-day problem behaviors at home, at school, and in the community. These issues include sexuality, abuse, juvenile delinquency, and teenage suicide. Other topics of study will be the development of the adolescent thought process and as well as the development of social cognition.

SOC311 Adult Issues: Young Adulthood 1
 A study of the issues of young adulthood. This is a critical period of marriage, families, beginning of careers, and child-rearing. Frames of reference for looking at adult development include a chronological viewpoint as well as biological, cultural, and developmental perspectives.

SOC312 Adult Issues: Young Adulthood 1
 This course will deal with the issues of mid-life, including a look at “mid-life crisis,” menopause, and the empty-nest syndrome. A further look at the issues of mid-life as they relate to occupation, marriage, children, family, and approaching retirement.

SOC313 Aging and the Elderly 2
 A study is made of an important transitional time of life. This study includes the development of the self in later adulthood, including physical changes, cognitive functioning, and personality patterns and changes. An overview of the issues of the elderly are considered, including retirement, sickness, loss of a spouse, dependency on adult children, and impending death.

SOC321 Marriage and the Family 2
 An introduction to the family. Topics include what constitutes a family, God’s purpose for the family, threats to the family, and how to deal with family problems. It also includes a study of the roles of husbands, wives, fathers, mothers, and children.

SOC331 Family Issues 1
 This course deals with issues of the family including divorce, single-parenting,

family racial and cultural, social class and poverty, family communication and conflict, and family violence and abuse.

SOC471 Principles of Effective Interpersonal Relationships 2
 This course presents a holistic, integrated, principle-centered approach for solving personal and professional problems. Principles of fairness, integrity, honesty, and human dignity will be presented to help give the student the security to adapt to change, and the wisdom and power to take advantage of the opportunities that change creates.

SOC461 Social Issues I 1
 A study which includes the understanding of social problems, including their causes and consequences. An overview of contemporary social issues such as problems of deviance, drugs and alcohol, health care, crime and delinquency, and violence.

SOC462 Social Issues II 1
 A continuation of SOC461 and the study of contemporary social issues. Problems with poverty, the aged, gender, and race will be studied.

SOC463 Social Issues III 1
 A continuation of SOC461 and SOC462 with a further look at contemporary social issues. Problems associated with the workplace, education, and the family will be studied. Also, the global social problems of war, the ecology, and the world population will be further analyzed.

SOC471-473 Seminar 1-3
 A seminar of selected contemporary topics.

SOC481 Sociology of Unconventional Religious Lifestyles in America 1
 This is a highly interesting study of special religious groups throughout American History, including the Gypsies, the Old Order Amish, the Shakers, the Oneida Community, the Mormons, the Hutterites, and the Father Divine Movement.

American Cultural Studies

ACS201 The American Covenant 1
 A course in the fundamental principles of American history and government which can help train children in the art of self-government and future leadership.

ACS202 American History from a Christian Perspective 2
 A study of the founding of America with emphasis on the purposes of God. A look at the early founding fathers and their Christian influence upon our nation.

ACS203	Faith of Our Founding Fathers	1
A course dedicated to the proposition that our founding fathers were indeed faithful Christians, or they were individuals who held firmly to a distinctively Christian view of what America and the world should be.		
ACS211	Introduction to Black History in America	3
A course designed to appreciate blacks' contribution to American History. Includes a study of blacks' fight for freedom in this nation up to the modern civil rights movement.		
ACS401	America's Dates with Destiny	1
This course studies twenty-three extraordinary events in our nation's history, each date representing a crossroads in our democracy.		
ACS411	God and Government: A Biblical and Historical Study	1
Concerning government, the biblical perspective is emphasized in relation to the historical perspective.		

Education

EDU301	Intro to Christian Education	1
A brief background and history of Christian education. The objective of this course is to provide insight into the Christian school movement, why it is happening, what the schools are like, and what their impact may be on the future of American education.		
EDU302	Intro to the Ministry of Teaching	1
Whether you are called to be a Christian School teacher or a Sunday School teacher, important principles of teaching are taught in this course.		
EDU311	Teaching Morals in Elementary Grades	1
A study of biblical morals and Christian values, including the Ten Commandments. Other topics include the virtues of telling the truth, respecting others, responsibility, dependability, commitment, trustworthiness, and other related topics. Other issues include courage, compassion, loyalty, friendship, persistence, hard work, and self-discipline.		
EDU312	Teaching Morals in the Secondary Grades	1
A study of biblical morals with the Ten Commandments being the foundation. A look at the Sermon on the Mount and the book of Proverbs. Also, a study of Kohlberg's Theory of Moral Development.		

EDU321	The Psychology of Education	2
A study of cognitive psychology applied to teaching, including an introduction to cognitive processes, memory and concepts, intelligence and cognitive development, and the development of language. Other topics will include the development of positive self-concepts, moral development, motivation, and social learning and modeling.		
EDU401	Christian School Curriculum	3
This course is based on the book, <i>The Educated Child</i> by William J. Bennett. It is a secular book with a good foundation for a good, solid, conservative-based curriculum which can be applied to Christian Schools or Home Schools.		
EDU451	Teaching Exceptional Students	1
An introduction to the characteristics of exceptional children and the various ways in which they are educated.		
EDU452	Strategies for Teaching Exceptional Students	1
A major emphasis on the techniques and classroom practices in working with children who are having particular difficulties in reading.		
EDU471	Practice Teaching in Elementary and Middle Grades I	3
Four weeks of practice teaching under a supervisor in a Christian School.		
EDU472	Practice Teaching in Elementary and Middle Grades II	3
Four weeks of practice teaching under a supervisor in a Christian School.		
EDU481	Practice Teaching in High School I	3
Six weeks of practice teaching under a supervisor in a Christian School.		
EDU482	Practice Teaching in High School II	3
Six weeks of practice teaching under a supervisor in a Christian School.		
<i>The following courses are taught in other departments, but they can also apply toward a degree in education. The student must declare at the beginning of the class which credit is desired.</i>		
SOC211	Child Training	1
A course in training children for the Lord. A study of early childhood, including topics on understanding children's behavior and misbehavior. Learning how to help children to accept responsibilities by teaching them natural and logical consequences.		
SOC221	Seminar on Child Abuse	1
This course is designed to bring awareness and training to those who work with children, whether that be in the school, church, or community. The recognition of the signs of abuse are discussed as well as legal and ethical issues related to child abuse. Child abuse can be physical, emotional, psychological, or sexual.		
SOC231	Introduction to Human Development	1

An introduction to human development including history of developmental studies and current issues in developmental studies. Theories of development with a special study of Erikson's Psychosocial Theory. An overview of the major stages of human development over the lifespan.

SOC240 Prenatal, Birth, and Infancy 1

This course is devoted to the study of human development from conception to birth and finally through the first two years of life.

SOC241 Early Childhood Development 1

A study of the physical, psycho-social, and cognitive development of children from birth through the preschool years. An in-depth look at the development of the nervous system, motor skills, perception, and learning of children in first two years of life. Also, includes the role of play in early childhood. Same course as EDU241.

SOC301 Adolescence 2

A study of the biological, psychological, sociological, and spiritual issues of youth from early adolescence through the teen years. This course covers a range of practical issues including a study of day-to-day problem behaviors at home, at school, and in the community. These issues include sexuality, abuse, juvenile delinquency, and teenage suicide. Other topics of study will be the development of the adolescent thought process and as well as the development of social cognition.

ACS201 The American Covenant 1

A course in the fundamental principles of American history and government which can help train children in the art of self-government and future leadership.

ACS202 American History from a Christian Perspective 2

A study of the founding of America with emphasis on the purposes of God. A look at the early founding fathers and their Christian influence upon our nation.

ACS203 Faith of Our Founding Fathers 1

A course dedicated to the proposition that our founding fathers were indeed faithful Christians, or they were individuals who held firmly to a distinctively Christian view of what America and the world should be.

ACS211 Introduction to Black History in America 3

A course designed to appreciate blacks contribution to American History. Includes a study of blacks' fight for freedom in this nation up to the modern civil rights movement.

ACS401 America's Dates with Destiny 1

This course studies twenty-three extraordinary events in our nation's history, each date representing a crossroads in our democracy.

ACS411 God and Government: A Biblical and Historical Study 1

Communications

ENG101 English Grammar I 1

An introduction to the basic grammatical structure of the English language for those who plan to become teachers or preachers.

ENG102 English Grammar II 1

A continuation of the study of the basic grammatical structure of the English language.

ENG103 English Grammar III 1

An intermediate study of grammatical structure of the English language.

ENG201 English Composition I 1

Instruction and practice in effective expository writing with emphasis on clarity of central and supporting ideas, development, logical organization, coherence and grammatical and mechanical accuracy.

ENG202 English Composition II 1

Practical application of skills learned with emphasis on style, use of the library, reading, evaluating and using available sources, planning, writing, and documenting a short research paper.

SPH201 Speech 3

Fundamentals of speech including effective expression. Learning keys to effective speech, including developing your purpose, subject, and material as well as organizing your speech.

Foreign Languages

SPN101 Introduction to Conversational Spanish I 1

This is a very basic introductory course to give you a feel for the Spanish language. Basic practical vocabulary is taught. (Twelve classroom hours)

SPN101 Introduction to Conversational Spanish II 1

A continuation of SPN101. (Twelve classroom hours).

Speech

SPH201 Introduction to Public Speaking I 1

This is a basic introductory course in public speaking, with the first course teaching the principles of public speaking including how to write a speech.

SPH202 Introduction to Public Speaking II

This is a continuation of SPH201 with more emphasis on the experience of public speaking.

BIB502	Theology from a Kingdom Perspective II	2
	A study of man, sin, covenant, the Incarnation, the Atonement, the Exaltation of Christ, and the Calling of God are subjects studied from a Kingdom Perspective.	
BIB503	Theology from a Kingdom Perspective III	2
	Regeneration, Justification, Sanctification, Perseverance, the Holy Spirit, the Church, the Kingdom, the Millennium, and the New Heavens and the New Earth are subjects studied from a Kingdom Perspective.	
BIB515	A Study of the Tabernacle of Moses	3
	God commanded Moses to construct earthly representations of everything he saw in the heavenlies. Each part of Moses' Tabernacle holds the key to New Covenant Revelation of the Plan and Purpose of God.	
BIB531	Wisdom from the Proverbs of Solomon	2
	Wisdom for practical everyday issues is found in the Proverbs of Solomon.	
BIB541	The Grace & Sovereignty of God	2
	A study of the divine grace of God as can only be discovered in the New Covenant God has made with His people through the shed blood of His Son Jesus the Christ. God is sovereign, and His will shall be accomplished to fulfill His purpose in the earth.	
BIB542	Advanced Concepts of the Kingdom of God I	2
	The Kingdom of God is the domain over which King Jesus rules, and that Kingdom has been preached from the time Jesus began His earthly ministry.	
BIB543	Advanced Concepts of the Kingdom of God II	2
	A continuation of BIB542. A study of the fulfillment of God's Eternal Purposes in the Earth through a correct understanding of the Kingdom of God on earth. God's will shall be completely done in earth as it is in heaven.	
BIB552	Realities of the New Creation	2
	As the result of Jesus' fulfillment of His purpose in the earth by becoming the Lamb slain from the foundation of the earth, we as new creations once again have access into the presence of God. We now sit with Him in heavenly places as the righteousness of God.	
BIB553	Realities of the New Creation II	2
	The first half of this course deals with the preeminence, Lordship, and centrality of the Lord Jesus Christ. The second half deals with the truth of Christ in us the	

hope of glory. Also, the government of God—the rule of God in the earth will be discussed.

BIB555 The New Covenant—A New and Better Way 3

The New Covenant offers a better ministry, a better priesthood, as Jesus has become King and Priest after the order of Melchizedec. An in-depth look at the New Covenant as it is presented in the Book of Hebrews.

BIB571 Preterism and Matthew 24 2

A study of Matthew 24 from the standpoint that the events of the chapter have already been fulfilled and do not refer to some far-away future dispensational period in the end times.

BIB585 The Book of Revelation 2

This two and one-half credit course is a most unique study chapter by chapter and verse by verse of the Book of Revelation with a total emphasis on “The Revelation of Jesus Christ.”

BIB591 The Pauline Revelation 2

What is meant by the Pauline Revelation? What was the gospel that Paul preached? How was it different from the Gospel that had previously been taught? This is a study of the revelation of the Glorified Christ, the meaning of the Work of Redemption, and the Church as the Body of Christ.

BIB612 Spiritual Interpretation of the Feasts of Israel 2

The children of Israel in the Old Testament were commanded to come together three times a year in celebration of Holy Feast Days. These Feast Days have a deeper, New Covenant spiritual meaning which reveals the true Plan of Redemption.

BIB620 A Study of Spiritual Alien Entities 2

While we do not adhere to an overemphasis on the Kingdom of Darkness, it is well that we be equipped to recognize those aliens of the spirit world.

BIB631 The Apocalypse: What Is It? 2

Doomsayers have created fear by teaching the Apocalypse as some terrifying future manifestation of demonic beast coming up out of the sea, when in actuality, the apocalypse is an unveiling, not of the anti-Christ, but the Christ of God. We shall look at the major events of the Book of Revelation as the ongoing revelation of the Kingdom of God.

BIB635 The Church, the World, and the Kingdom 2

Is there a difference in how the Church and the Kingdom of God relate to the world? How does the working of the Kingdom of God correlate to the kingdoms of this world? This is a study of a proper God worldview.

BIB661 Commentary of I and II Samuel 2

This is a study of the change of order from the kingdom of Saul to David’s kingdom. A look will be taken at the eternal Covenant that God made with

David and how that affects the plan and purpose of God today.

BIB671 Old Testament Prophets vs. New Testament Prophets 3

There is a gross misunderstanding of the ministry of the prophet. The Old Testament prophets had their calling which is quite different than the calling of the New Testament prophets.

BIB681 Present-day Truth of the New Creation 3

Focus will be on the preeminence, the Lordship, and the centrality of the Lord Jesus Christ. There is also a study of the government, rule and authority of God in the earth. Practically speaking it is His rule or His government in our life.

Ministries

MIN501 Foundations and Principles of Ministry I 2

This course will focus on the development of the person as a minister of the gospel. An emphasis will be placed on the eminence of the Word of God and some of the major doctrines of the first principles of the Bible.

MIN502 Foundations and Principles of Ministry II 2

This course will be a continuation of the first principles of the doctrines of Christ including atonement, justification, sanctification, faith, doctrine of baptisms, healing and the ministry of laying on of hand, and the resurrection. There will be a basic study of the person and work of the Holy Spirit.

MIN503 Foundations and Principles of Ministry III 2

The third course of this series will deal with the “spirit” world, spiritual warfare, and ministry of angels. In general, the student will study the principles of living a victorious, overcoming life.

MIN504 Foundations and Principles of Ministry IV 2

The final course in this series will deal the concept of us “being created for purpose and destiny.” We were created according to God’s predestined plan—for His pleasure and for us to serve Him. We have been created to be a world changer, as salt and light. We also were created as stewards of the earth.

MIN543 Dealing with Problems of Everyday Life 2

This course will focus on emotional problems that people face everyday day—depression, loneliness, anger, etc. The purpose of the course is to deal with personal issues in order to help others with like problems.

MIN551 Leadership Development 2

To be an effective minister, one must be an effective leader. There are godly principles in helping to develop leadership qualities. A look will be taken at leadership styles and principles for inspiring, motivating, and influencing others.

MIN571 Ministerial Etiquette 2

There are proper ways in relating to other ministries. Special topics will be

covered that relate to all phases of ministering in another pulpit and in handling special cases that arise in the course of ministry.	
MIN581 Church Structure and Ministries	2
The Local Church is the earthly institution to carry out the will of God in the earth. It is here where the government of God is demonstrated. This course is the study of the structure of church government as well as the various ministries of the Church.	
MIN591 Hermeneutics	2
Hermeneutics is a study of the principles by which one can properly interpret the Word of God. Various means of interpreting the Bible will be studied.	
MIN623 Interpretation of Dreams	2
Dreams can be very important in revealing what is in a person's subconscious as well as a means of divine communication with God. There must be an understanding of certain principles of dream interpretation to adequately make a distinction between that which is spiritual and that which is non-spiritual; although, understanding both is important.	
MIN641 Music and the Arts in Christian Worship	2
This is a survey of the history of music and the arts in Christian Worship throughout the last several centuries.	
MIN642 The Pastor, Church, and the Law	2
Administering church business is much like many other organizations. There should be an adequate understanding of laws that relate to non-profit organizations as well as other legal issues.	
MIN661 The Ministry of the Word	2
The Ministry of the Word should take preeminence over every other ministry in the church. This is a look at the different kinds of ministry and the work of the Holy Spirit's interpretation and revelation.	
MIN662 A Study of Watchman Nee's Writings	2
The spiritual writings of Watchman Nee has had a great impact upon the Christian community of the Twentieth Century. He spent many years in a Chinese prison as the result of his stand for his Christian faith. He has left a great legacy and deposit of great spiritual principles for the maturing of the saints of God.	
MIN671 The Art of Interpersonal Relationships	2
This will be the study of seven very important principles that can lead to the enhancement of interpersonal relationships in working in cooperation with others.	
MIN672 Homiletics	2
Homiletics has been defined as the art of writing and preaching sermons. Basic principles of Homiletics will be considered.	

MIN681 Helping Others Cope with Problems of Life	2
The world is full of problems, and the Christian community is no exception. A number of spiritual and emotional issues are studied with biblical solutions to the problems and weights that "so easily beset us."	
MIN682 Ministry to Families and Marriages	3
There is no other earthly institution that is more important to God than that of the family. There are satanic attacks on the families that are designed to distract God's people from their destiny. The sanctity of marriage is also important to God, and every effort should be made to preserve this most sacred of relationships.	
MIN683 Ministry to Adolescents	3
An understanding of the uniqueness of this important period of human development, one of finding one's identity, is necessary in effectively ministering to adolescents.	
MIN684 Ministry to Young Adults	2
This is a period of human development where critical issues of marriage choices, child rearing, and the beginning of one's career. There are many stressors that exist in this period of life, if not dealt with, can put an undue strain on one's mental health as well as meaningful relationships. One of the most important roles of this period are parenting small children.	
MIN685 Ministry to Adults in Midlife	2
To be an effective minister, one needs to understand each period of human development. This period of development has its unique issues, including those related to the realization of one's need to establish one's legacy in life.	
MIN686 Leadership Development	2
One of the most neglected areas of ministry is to our senior saints. Our American culture has not given proper honor and respect to those who have paved the way for us both in the natural and in the spirit. There is a need to minister to these with special needs of health and relationships issues.	
MIN687 Gender Studies	2
The issue of gender has been one in which inequalities have been glaring. The church must take the lead in addressing issues that relate to gender, realizing that in Christ Jesus, there is neither male nor female. Each deserve equal opportunity and respect for the work of the ministry. There is a need to be biblical without respect to a worldly "political correctness."	
MIN691 The Apostolic Ministry	2
One of the results of the Latter Rain Renewal of the 1940s was an emphasis on modern-day apostles. There is a critical need for the apostolic ministry of fathers to the Body of Christ.	
MIN692 The Prophetic Ministry	2

geography in Asia Minor and the Mediterranean area will be considered. There will be a look at the major cities of the Roman provinces and cities where many of the first century churches were established.

CUL621 The History of World Societies 2

This is a study of world societies throughout the centuries, beginning with the origin of civilizations, the empires of the Babylonians, Greeks, and Romans. Other societies studied will be those of Western Europe as well as those of the Middle East and Africa.

CUL631 Martyrs throughout Church History 2

Men and women of faith and courage have given their lives for the cause of Christ. To these we owe a great debt of gratitude, beginning with the first great persecution of Christians by the Emperor Nero around 67 which claimed the lives of the Apostles, Peter and Paul.

CUL641 Global Insights into Contemporary Issues 2

There are many contemporary issues that affect all of the nations and peoples of the world including poverty, hunger, and health. Many other issues that are important to the Christian Church will be studied.

CUL642 Crisis in American Institutions 2

There are crises in America that we as the Church are faced with including those of economics, inequality, racism, sexism, families, the environment, health and welfare, crime and justice, as well as many others.

CUL643 Multi-Cultural Studies 2

The United States, more so than any other nation of the world, has become a mosaic of a variety of cultures. It is important to study the impact of these multiple cultures on the mission of the Church.

CUL644 The Environment and God's Earth 2

God has given us a mandate to preserve the earth that He has given us dominion over. Have we abused our place of habitation? We will look at pragmatic ways of being good stewards of the resources God has given us without making a religion out of "environmentalism."

CUL651 Black History Studies 3

One of the most significant minorities of our society has been neglected in the education of people of their contributions in every phase of life. This is an opportunity to appreciate the contributions of a people who were involuntarily brought into our society.

CUL661 Cultural Conflicts 2

To transform the conflicts besetting the world today, we need to uncover the conceptions of peace within our diverse religious and cultural traditions, while seeking the common ground among them. People of faith play a very important role in accomplishing these goals.

CUL671 Denominationalism in the U. S. 2

Every major move of God has usually ended in the formation of denominations that put parameters in place that often hampered the continuation of the move of God's Spirit. A study of the purposes and effects of denominationalism will be made.

CUL681 Issues for the 21st Century Church 2

Some of the epic battles of the 21st Century that the Church must address include Racism, Diversity, Controlling Spirits, Illegitimate Authority, Religious Spirits, Need for Unity, and the Battle for Life and Liberty.

Research

RES601 Research Techniques 2

This course is a requirement for those writing theses and dissertations. We will be looking at some common methods of research, especially as it relates to Christian writings.

RES699 Dissertation 2

All candidates for the doctoral program must register for and complete all requirements for a dissertation. The dissertation topic will be determined by interaction between the student and the major advisor of his or her program of study.
